COMMITTEES are an important and active part of the League. Listed below are some of the LWVJA committees, descriptions of their work and their activities over the past year. More committees will be described in the next newsletter.

Voter Services The 2020 election provided many opportunities and challenges to provide information to voters. Key activities have been:

- Contacting candidates for public office to encourage them to provide information for
- VOTE411, which was published online and in paper format. 1700 paper copies of the VOTE411 guide were distributed locally. Collecting signatures to make sure Proposal 2 was on the November ballot
- Hosting candidate forums for Jackson County Commission Districts 5 and 7
- Writing and mailing GOTV postcards to almost 1000 newly registered voters in our area.

Observer Corps The Observer Corps formed in late 2021. During 2022, their work has included:

- Observing 13 government entities in the Jackson area by 12 committee members
- Meeting at both the local and state level to compare experiences and learn more about how Sunshine laws impact and interact with meetings of governmental entities. Contact: Nancy Smith or Deborah Sears

Tea Committee The 2022 Friendship Tea was held on Saturday, November 11.

- Thirteen tables were decorated by league members and 71 people plus volunteers attended.
- Overall proceeds of just under \$5,000.00 were realized, which included ticket sales, sponsorships, donations, and jewelry sales and silent auction bids.


Minutes of the April 14 meeting and the treasurer's report were approved. Our operating balance is just under \$9,000.00.

Sunshine Week from Wikipedia the free encyclopedia

Sunshine Week is a national initiative spearheaded by the News Leaders Association to educate the public about the importance of open government and the dangers of excessive and unnecessary secrecy. It was established in March 2005 by the American Society of News Editors, now known as the News Leaders Association, with funding from the John S. and James L. Knight Foundation.(1)

Overview

Sunshine Week occurs each year in mid-March, coinciding with James Madison's birthday and National Freedom of Information Day on the 16th. During Sunshine Week, hundreds of media organizations, civic groups, libraries, non-profits, schools and other participants engage public discussion on the importance of open government through news and feature articles and opinion columns; special Web pages and blogs; info graphics; editorial cartoons; public service advertising; public seminars and forums. The purpose of the week is to highlight the fact that "government functions best when it operates in the open."(2) In many states, however, legislatures exempt themselves from public-records laws, claiming "legislative immunity".(3)

History The first nationwide Sunshine Week took place March 13–19, 2005.


