# Spotlight on Lola Dodge: A Legacy of Civic Engagement and Mentorship

In this League of Women Voters Jackson Area newsletter, we shine a light on Lola Dodge a League Life Member and a dedicated member whose journey with the League has spanned several decades. Lola's story is one of unwavering commitment to civic engagement, mentorship, and community involvement.

Lola Dodge joined the League of Women Voters in the late 1950s, and her involvement has been nothing short of remarkable. She has held various leadership roles, including local Board secretary, treasurer, and director. Lola told her colleagues that she would do any job except president, and she did do most LWV jobs. Finally, she agreed to be a co-president and later president for a brief time. She served on the LWVMI board, co-chairing committees on energy and health care. In the early 70's, during the energy crisis, the state and national LWV were very active in educating and advocating about energy, and Lola became quite an expert. Her dedication to these issues highlights her passion for addressing critical issues that impact our community.

Lola's League involvement has taken her to state and national conventions where she represented our local League and contributed to important discussions. Her enthusiasm for meeting and conventions is evident; she often attended these as a proxy for the president, ensuring that the League's voice was heard. Born and raised in Jackson County, Lola's roots run deep. Despite spending time overseas due to her husband's work, she always returned to Jackson, where she continued her work with the League. She stayed informed and engaged even while abroad, speaking to her dedication to the LWV mission.

Mentorship has played a significant role in Lola's life. She credits many "nice ladies" who helped her throughout her career, particularly in her work as a librarian. She learned on the job. She worked as a branch librarian for the Jackson District Library, and served on the JDL board. For many years, she was in charge of the JDL Used Bookstore in the basement of the library annex next to the Carnegie Branch. If you had League business with her, you could usually find her there. Lola's experience underscores the importance the mentorship within the League, where members support and guide each other.

One of Lola's most passionate causes is voter turnout. She believes in the power of voting and has always encouraged others to exercise their right to vote. She was active in the many tasks of LWV Voter Service over the years. Her family's tradition of voting, with her mother being a Republican and her father a Democrat, instilled in her the importance of civic participation. Lola's advice to young people interested in activism is simple: find where you can work on something that matters to you. The League of Women Voters has partnered with the Girl Scouts of America, fostering mentorship and civic engagement among younger generations. At our most recent tea event, Girl Scouts served sandwiches and tea and engaged with League members to discuss and learn. This partnership is an example of the League's commitment to nurturing future leaders. Lola's story serves as an inspiration to all member of the League of Women Voters Jackson Area. We are grateful for Lola's contributions and the lasting impact she has had on our community.



### **FAQ**

### What is the League's Observer Corps?

The Observer Corps (OC) is a structured way for a local League to observe various governmental agencies to determine if they are being conducted to be a valuable service to the community. OC puts an agency on notice that the community is interested in their actions, has a general understanding of what those agencies provide, and may respond to their actions. Through this process our goal is to encourage better, more transparent government.



An important guide for the Observer Corps is the "Open Meetings Act." By law, all meetings of government entities must be open to the public. OC activities can ensure that the issues facing the community are being handled in the open. Through our presence, local elected and appointed officials are put on notice that the public cares and is watching what decisions are made and how they are being made.

### MORE ABOUT LWVJA OBSERVER CORPS

### What does a League Observer actually do?

Member choose what entity to observe on a regular basis with the explicit purpose of seeing how that public body conducts its business, makes decisions, and responds to public input. LWVJA President sends official notice to the head of that entity to alert them to our group and who will be Observing. Members wears an official name tag

and special OC button to meetings. Observers take notes, complete a simple form, do not offer any comments and alert the league of any possible advocacy issue.

With the demise of much local media our Observer Corps can also serve to inform the public as well as our own members of what is going on in the Jackson area. Local OC's tailor activities to what their members choose. A local league may have structured regular means to share what they learn with members during the year. ### **Observer Corps Special post-election Projects**

**Board of Canvassers:** At election time throughout Michigan, local leagues have become active observing many local Boards of Canvassers. LWVJA members have become very active and faithful participants in this critical step in our election process. It is a terrific way to give testament to the integrity of our local elections. Members can volunteer to monitor for a few hours or whatever fits their schedule. Guidance is provided.

<u>Michigan Independent Redistricting Commission (MIRC):</u> The state league recruited 100 volunteers o observe every meeting of the new Michigan Independent Redistricting Commission beginning in 2021. Our Observer were active participants in identifying Communities of Interest, and testifying at public hearings. The new voting districts were in place for the 2024 election

**By-Laws** is not generally a topic of hot conversation. But think about this. The League of Women Voters is 105 years old. LWVJA is into our 11th year and our presence in Jackson goes back to 1920. Organizations last this long because they have a Mission people care about and rules and regulations to ensure focus on the Mission and principles.

Reviewing by-laws is not for everyone. This year, we have five members who took this role very seriously, volunteering their services to complete this task.

We were fortunate this cycle to have a by-laws Committee which included:

- A Life Time Member (at least 50 consecutive years of membership) to give us a true north perspective
- Two members who served as President and Treasurer in 2018, helped create the 2018 by-laws, and have been League members for over 10 years.
- Two members who "love" by-laws and have been active participants on by-laws Committees with other organizations, bringing a world of experience and a serious attitude into their work during this year's review.

These five worked diligently this winter and spring through many hours and meetings to update the by-laws and improve them to keep us working effectively, efficiently and in sync with changes in LWV national by-laws. LWVJA Board reviewed their suggested changes. Members at our annual meeting approved them. This process is followed every two years.

If you are one of those who seldom gives by-laws a thought or may even get cross-eyed at the thought of by-laws, you may want to thank those Committee Members who did their due diligence to keep our league running smoothly.

LWVJA League History

A group of LWVJA members originally created by-laws which were approved by the Michigan League when our application for League Status was approved in 2018. Original by-laws were patterned after the Lansing Area's by-laws and in compliance with National by-laws. Since then, we have grown, changed and adapted during a chaotic time.

In 10 years we have grown from 10 members to 60, developed programs to fit our local interests, always remaining committed to empowering voters and defending democracy. The Pandemic did not stop us but did require some emergency and lessons-learned by-laws updating. We worked during and through the Pandemic when no in-person events were allowed. And we ALWAYS remain committed to the League's 105 years of Nonpartisan Policy.
